In November 2019 we held our Annual General Meeting (AGM) in the beautiful hills of Cumbria, welcoming over 125 landworkers and allies, and musicians and storytellers. As our AGMs grows each year, our event organising is being fine tuned to make it a smoother, more participatory and relaxed gathering.

At our 2019 AGM we had a fantastic crew of facilitators, organisers and the Landworkers' Alliance 'vibesmiths' who worked hard in supporting everyone to hold the space, facilitate sessions, and create the all important social vibes essential to working hard! We were also committed to working to make LWA events intergenerational and this year we welcome a great gang of the youngest of generations and the wisdom they bring to the gathering.

We hosted several public debates and discussions on key issues affecting food, farming and land use. We heard about the work that is taking place in northern England and the UK to protect assets of community value and the future of the uplands, holding debates and strategic discussions about how we develop our campaigns and positions on these.

In addition to plenary presentations and debates we had an exciting array of member led sessions and sectoral organising spaces throughout the weekend ranging from discussions about Farming, Forestry and Feminism, Co-ops and Bioregions, Mobilizing for COP 26 in Glasgow, Food and Social Justice, Climate Chaos and Land use and many more. We also spent time in our sectors, branches and regions strategizing how we wanted to organise and develop the Landworkers' Alliance as a union at a local grassroots level.

The Landworkers' Alliance Annual General Meeting and Winter Shindig is one of our most important gatherings each year as we come together as land based workers and allies together from across the UK, collectively set our work agenda for the following year, organise skill shares and exchanges, elect our coordinating group, stategise around the development of the union, and work hard and party hard as we build and strengthen a movement for food, farming and climate justice!

#### Day 1 : Saturday 23rd November

**Session 1: WELCOME CELEBRATION, INTRODUCTIONS AND ROUND UP OF THE YEAR** This session included a welcome celebration, ice breakers, housekeeping and a round up of the year looking back on key activities, events, programmes and achievements of the Landworkers' Alliance in 2019.

# **Session 3: FARMING, FORESTRY AND FEMINISM:** who works the land, who is visible and why?

An open discussion space was held to share experiences as women working in land based industries and the successes and obstacles faced. The discussion explored experiences including but not limited to, issues around visibility and various forms of emotional and care labour on and off the land.

#### Session 4: BRANCH AND REGIONAL ASSEMBLY (PRESENTATIONS AND PROPOSALS)

The Regional Assembly was a key part of the weekend, bringing LWA members from across the UK together to learn how each region is organising at a grassroots level and to get ideas and inspiration from each other. The presentations were followed by regional break-out groups to develop future plans and programs in each region.

This year we will also held a discussion on creating a LWA UK wide assembly. This would bring together representatives from the LWA's regions, branches, sectors and working groups with staff and the coordinating group to meet bi-annually. This assembly will help us improve our organising and communication across the LWA and help us improve our influence, power and reach. This proposal was based on the governance model used by Confederation Paysanne, the French farming union.

### Day 2 : Sunday 23rd November

#### SUNDAY SESSIONS AND LANDWORKERS' EXCHANGES.

We have 10 fantastic sessions organised and led by LWA members on the Sunday morning.

#### SESSION ONE: FIBERS AND FOOD / FASHION AND FARMING

Wool, leather and flax stems are too often seen as byproducts of food production systems rather than valuable resources in their own right. Moreover, the quality of UK fibres has been significantly compromised over the last fifty years due to prioritisation of genetic selection for meat production and yield. This workshop will call on participants to explore the parallels between food and fibre farming and how the two systems could be better connected. #### SESSION TWO: CLIMATE, LAND-USE AND NET ZERO

Everyone-ish agrees we're in a climate emergency - but what does that mean for land use? What would the landscape look like if we achieved UK net zero emissions? Is the NFU's plan for netzero 2040 any good? What would a LWA 'policy' on addressing climate issues look like? And how could we win? # **SESSION THREE: CO-OPS AND BIO REGIONS:** An economic, social model to underpin the agroecology movement?

Agroecological Cooperatives (AE) are a model to join up production, certification, education, marketing, distribution resource sharing and investment to provide a joined up to food access. This will be an opportunity to discuss and plan together following a proposal on how creating participatory guarantee systems for regional certification can link to all of the above, take the pressure off producers and drive new, local investment into agroecology by sharing our resources and becoming more than the sum of our parts.

#### SESSION SEVEN: EXPLORING A VEGANISM BASED ON FOOD SOVEREIGNTY

The Industrial Food System can easily incorporate and dilute the politics of individual food choices, and so currently many corporations are now providing vegan products, often produced in extractive ways that damage communities, ecologies and climate resilience around the world - in similar ways as industrial livestock systems do. This session will be hosted by vegan LWA members who are involved in small scale agro ecological and community based food production, and we will explore how can we work towards a veganism based on food sovereignty which encompasses these politics and works within the framework of social justice. **Please note:** *This is a space for visioning what a veganism based on food sovereignty could look like, and is not a debate between the merits of veganism vs animal agriculture.*
